

VES Awards: 'Gravity' Wins 6 Including Top Prize; 'Frozen' Goes 4-For-4; 3 Nods For 'Game Of Thrones'

The much talked-about visual effects in <u>Alfonso</u>

<u>Cuaron</u>'s space thriller dazzled even the pros, as

<u>Gravity</u> floated away with six wins at the <u>VES Awards</u>

tonight. The pic won in all but one of its categories,
including the big prize of Outstanding Visual Effects in
a Visual Effects-Driven Feature Motion Picture. Cuaron



capped off his film's big night with the Visual Effects Society's Visionary Award. Cuaron accepting his honor said briefly, "Finally, visual effects are merging into the whole process of the cinematic experience," the filmmaker said in his acceptance speech. "It's about the integration of lights, sets and even actors." *Gravity* continued its awards-season momentum, following up on big wins at the <u>Art Directors Guild Awards</u>, the <u>American Society of Cinematographers Awards</u> and <u>DGA Awards</u>.

Meanwhile, <u>Frozen</u> further cemented its Oscar frontrunner status with wins in all four of its categories. *Pacific Rim*, which entered the 12th annual VES Awards with six nominations, second only to *Gravity*, went home empty-

handed. And, just like last year, HBO's <u>Game Of Thrones</u> was the big winner on the TV side with three VES Awards, also missing out in just one of its nommed categories. The evening also featured a tribute to VFX pioneer Ray Harryhausen, who <u>died</u> in May, and a Lifetime Achievement Award to Oscar and Emmy winner John Dykstra, whose credits range from the original *Star Wars* and *Battlestar Galactica* to *Spider-Man* and *Django Unchained*. As the 186-minute show ending, host <u>Patton Oswalt</u> quipped, ""Omigod! Who's president now!?"

It's shaping up to be a big night for Alfono Cuaron's space thriller. The flick is 3-for-3 already, with four categories to go (it's double-nominated in one). Plus the Visionary Award for Cuaron.

Oswalt introduced this category as the "Hey old visual effects artists, here's comes your competition!" award. "This category marks a grim part of the evening for a lot of vets, when they order a lot of scotch."

Next up is a tribute to the late VFX pioneer Ray Harryhausen.

VES Chairman Jeffrey A. Okun took the podium to briefly remember visual effects maestro Ray Harryhausen, who died in May. Okun exclaimed, "I asked this gentleman, how he did what he did and Ray would say, 'I just didn't know I could do it. It seemed obvious to me." Okun soon learned Harryhausen's trick to great visual effects was his work ethic, which he says entailed "not writing anything down. Don't open the door, leave the phone, and don't eat." Before a bio clip of Harryhausen played, Okun called those in the crowd to "stand up, if Ray inspired you," which resulted in a standing ovation.

A sampling of the effects legend's credits – picking just one per decade: *Mighty Joe Young* (1949), *The 7th Voyage of Sinbad* (1958), *One Million Years B.C.* (1966), *The Golden Voyage of Sinbad* (1973) and *Clash of the Titans* (1981).

Strike two: The presenter read correctly that *Gravity*: Exterior won, but they showed on the placard *Gravity* interior as the winner. Oswald came out and said the placard was wrong. "This is a shambles," the host said. "And dare I say not visually effective."

Well, *Gravity* had a minimum 40% chance of winning here. That's make the total so far *Gravity* 4, *Pacific Rim* 0.

On to John Dykstra's Lifetime Achievement Award.

"He has the rare qualities of being the guy who someone at a studio can look at and trust to win the race," VFX pioneer Douglas Trumbull said about his longtime peer and honoree. The two were often artistic rivals throughout the blockbuster decades, working on competitive projects. Trumbull's father even worked for Dykstra's company. "I turned down George Lucas when he asked me to do Star Wars," said Trumbull, "but he did ask John, and Star Wars under his command became one of the transformational movies in this industry." Trumbull wound up taking on Steven Spielberg's Close Encounters Of The Third Kind, which faced off against Star Wars for the VFX Oscar and lost. The two ended up collaborating on Star Trek: The Motion Picture. Concluding his speech, Trumbull said, "John and I crossed the the abyss from celluloid to digital."

The headline here is: *Gravity* loses!! Which puts a damper on the next presentation from the podium: the Visionary Award to Alfonso Cuaron (oh, not really).

A featurette showing Cuaron's accomplishments on *Gravity* preceded his honor. In the reel, producer David Heyman exclaimed, "I would make the yellow pages with Alfonso!" while actress <u>Sandra Bullock</u> said: "Alfonso was told that *Gravity* couldn't be done. Every visual he gives you, every sound that you hear, was created to his exact specification." Bullock, who <u>presented the DGA Award to Cuaron</u>, then took the podium to present him with the VES honor. "Alfonso's talent ensured that my makeup in 3D wouldn't have the same appearance as that in a horror film." Cuaron accepting his honor said briefly, "Finally visual effects are merging into the whole process of the cinematic experience. It's about the integration of lights, sets and even actors."

Returning to the stage, Oswalt announced, "Sandra left her speech up here," before launching into a string of made-up insults by the *Gravity* actress. "'Fuck you, Peter Jackson.' 'Omigod, I can't believe this!' 'Go stick a 20-sided dice up your ...' 'Good luck at the Oscars, you nerd shitheads.'"
